The Final Voyage of the Karluk Word Search!

Search for the **bold, underlined words** in the *Karluk* story (see next page) horizontally, vertically, diagonally, forwards, and backwards.

This word search features words related to the final voyage of the <u>Karluk</u>, the flagship of the Canadian Arctic Expedition, led by Vilhjalmur <u>Stefansson</u>. The ship was wellluxuries including <u>chocolate</u> when she set sail from Esquimalt, British Columbia on June 17th, 1913, captained by Robert <u>Bartlett</u>.

As part of the *Karluk's* mission to conduct scientific <u>research</u>, the ship's location was recorded regularly using <u>latitude</u> and <u>longitude</u> of the ocean was measured using a **sounding machine**. The water's depth was

expedition's <u>oceanographer</u>, also operated a <u>dredge</u> to determine what types of sea life lived in the area. <u>Starfish</u> were some of the most common animals caught by the dredge.

The Karluk was trapped in sea ice in August 1913 and began to **drift** with the ice floe. Although the ship was stuck, the crew traveled by **ski**, and **sledge** to hunt for **seal** and to look for areas of open water, known as leads. The ice surrounding the Karluk eventually crushed the ship, which sank on January 11th, 1914.

Fortunately, by that time a camp, appropriately named "<u>Shipwreck Camp</u>" had been built on the ice. From there, the *Karluk*'s crew traveled over the ice to <u>Wrangel Island</u>, off the northeast coast of <u>Siberia</u>. Captain Bartlett and <u>Kataktovik</u>, an Inuit hunter, continued on from Wrangel Island in search of help and eventually reached the Siberian mainland. The remaining survivors, including the ship's cat, <u>Nigeraurak</u>, were finally rescued in September of 1914 by the ships <u>Bear</u>.
